

Bay looks to 'hold that line'

Dukes, new coach look to extend program's recent string of excellence

New head coach Jim Tietjen hopes the different profile he brings to this fall's Whitefish Bay football team yields results similar to the program's back-to-back 8-3 seasons, despite hefty graduation losses.

"The seniors we have out there are hungry to maintain the excellence," said Tietjen, who has been with the Bay program in one capacity or another for 14 of the last 17 years. "They know how to compete. They need to show the juniors and sophomores how to do that, too. Once that happens, we'll be fine."

Tietjen takes over for Joe Wieland, who brought excellence back to the Bay program but who resigned last spring after seven years. Departing at the same time were four CNI All-Suburban selections: running back Booker Stanley, two-way lineman Evan Engstrom, defensive back Alex Rios and receiver Justin Moreland. Stanley was also on several all-state teams and is on scholarship at the University Wisconsin.

"I think we'll do fine replacing the regular kind of kids," said Tietjen, "but in replacing the great players, each of the



other 11 on that side of the ball will have to do just a little more."

Tietjen will have to work with a senior corps that is spirited but which barely scratches double digits in numbers on the 50-player roster.

Leading the group will be linebacker/guard Joey Tietjen (6-0, 216) and talented defensive tackle/fullback Robert Smallins (6-0, 225). Smallins and Tietjen were two-thirds of a formidable linebacking corps last season, with Tietjen earning second-team all-league honors.

Others looked upon as impact players on defense are senior linebacker Peter Smith (6-0, 210), senior linebacker Alex Dwyer (6-1, 180), junior defensive back Dewey Coulson (5-8, 165) and two-way veteran junior lineman Jared Oberland (6-3, 220). Oberland will be looked upon to play a big role on the Bay offense at tight end.

Joey Tietjen and Oberland are captains.

On offense, junior letterman Dan Mehigan (5-8, 160) will be at the controls of the Blue Dukes' wing-T set. Looking to make up some of Stanley's yardage will be Smallins, Coulson and junior Eric Powell (5-11, 171). Senior Patrick Phillips (6-0, 175) is a letterman at kicker but is nursing an injury.

"We have some nice players out there. They just need to distinguish themselves," said Jim Tietjen. "We need to see if they can take it up to the next level."

Tietjen is looking to play a a lot of people and keep as many away from two-way status as possible.

"My philosophy is to do things in threes," he said. "Develop three quarterbacks, three linebackers, etc., so you're always bringing along people and developing them."

In the North Shore, Tietjen sees the 'big 3' of Homestead, Germantown and Cedarburg being solid again but figures that with a little development, his team can stay in the race.

"I was freshman coach the last three years, so I know all of these kids," he said. "I know how hard they've worked. They know what to expect from me and not a single one has quit so far. I love these guys."



Tietjen to go against former co-coaches

New Bay coach looks for Blues Dukes to put up good effort vs. Mukwonago

Though he's been coaching in one capacity or another for about 25 years, Jim Tietjen will get a real charge out of his opening night, when he starts his career as head man of the Whitefish Bay football team tonight.

When Tietjen's Blue Dukes take on Mukwonago at 8 p.m. in a Wisconsin Football Coaches Association Badger Classic game at Madison's Camp Randall Stadium, he'll be among old friends.

"I was at Mukwonago for seven years," said Tietjen, "and most of those guys are still there. Keith Hensler (the head coach) and Bill Hoagland. Toby Ackerman was coaching then, and now he's the athletic director. I tell you, they've been throwing me their usual stuff (over the phone)."

But Tietjen, who takes over from Joe Wieland, wouldn't have it any other way.

After two weeks of beating on each other, the Blue Dukes got a chance at some live hitting Friday in a scrimmage with South Milwaukee and West Allis Central.

Although Bay was down a few men due to precaution and injury, the results were pretty good, said Tietjen.

"We scored five or six times against South Milwaukee, but we had a little trouble (offensively) against Central," said Tietjen. "They scored only once on our first unit and we would have scored on a fumble recovery, so it was pretty much a draw."

Tietjen was pleased with the energy and the effort shown by the Blue Dukes.

"Defensively, we just ran to the ball," he said. "Every ball on the ground was ours. That's a real tribute to the kids, and the Mukwonago coaches (watching the scrimmage) thought we really hustled."

Tietjen was especially pleased with the effort of tight end/linebacker Alex Dwyer. Dwyer was filling in for regular tight end Jared Oberland, who is nursing a hip flexor. Running back Dewey Coulson and kicker Patrick Phillips were also

held out.

Offensively, Tietjen thought halfback Eric Powell acquitted himself nicely along with fullbacks Chris Kregel and Mike Hardke.

Tietjen is looking forward to his official opener as head coach. The players have gone down to Marquette's Valley Fields to get accustomed to the artificial turf they will find in Madison and the coach wants the team to maintain perspective.

"The kids are understandably fired up," he said, "but I don't want them to be excited just for being there. We want to go down there as a program and show people we can play football."

The Badger Classic will feature 13 games over a three-day period at Camp Randall.

Mukwonago is a traditional Classic 8 Conference and state playoff power, with good size, speed and numbers. They'll run a variation of the wishbone called a flex-bone and may throw the ball up to 15 times a game.

"We've worked on everything," said Tietjen, "from what to do when the ball hits the ground to what kind of shoes we'll need on that turf. We'd love to be able to compete with them."

Bay boss banks on improvement

Tietjen stresses off-season work to help in NSC battle

Credited by Athletic Director Jeff Thielke for strong organizational skills and forward thinking in the way he evaluates and uses players, first-year White-fish Bay football coach Jim Tietjen would like to use his recently completed 3-6 campaign as a platform for bigger and better things.

"I know there's a lot of work ahead of me in order to make us respectable again," he said. "I thought with some breaks that we might be able to get back to the (state) playoffs and we could have with a little better effort in a couple of games."

The Blue Dukes finished the 2002 campaign on a positive note, with an 18-0 triumph over Grafton. That win ended a five-game losing streak and served as a breakthrough for an offense which had struggled to score in those losses.

Tietjen saw room for improvement in

all phases of the game.

"We simply have to in order to compete in this conference," he said. "At times we got a little desperate offensively and then we didn't take care of the ball very well. We need to get stronger so we don't have to become desperate.

"We also hung around in a few games against good teams (like Mukwonago and Cedarburg), where a ball on the ground or a similar break could have

changed things."

The offensive woes were highlighted during a four-game North Shore stretch where the Blue Dukes were outscored 121-12. That streak ended with the Grafton win.

Tietjen was proud of that triumph because it showed that the seniors had not quit, that they continued to hit. That was something Tietjen did take out of the season as a positive.

"We had great kids out there, especially our captains (seniors Joey Tietjen "We didn't hold the line of scrimmage often enough. We simply need to increase our strength."

and Robert Smallins, and juniors Chris Kregel and Jared Oberland)," said Coach Tietjen. "We've been meeting with about 10 kids a night for 15 to 20 minutes each since the end of the season. We've talked about what they need to do in terms of getting to the strength and size we think they should be. And we get them to participate in our off-season lifting and conditioning programs."

Off-season work is important to the

success of the team, Tietjen said.

"We didn't hold the line of scrimmage often enough," he said, "and that caught us sometimes. We simply need to increase our strength."

For the season, Bay scored 153 points (an average of 17 a game) and allowed

187 (an average of 20.8).

Robert Smallins was the leading rusher while junior quarterback Danny Mehigan and senior end Jeremy Majors were able to form an effective passing combination.

Defensively, Joey Tietjen, a three-year, two-way starter, was the stalwart from his linebacker's spot, as was Oberland (66 total tackles, 17 quarterback knockdowns) from his end position. Joey Tietjen had 52 solo tackles, 82 assists, caused six fumbles, had eight quarterback knockdowns and two blocked punts.

"He scored the most points I've ever given out (defensively)," said his father, Jim.

"We could look at something on film and he could make the adjustment on the field." Tietjen is mulling walk-on offers from Wisconsin and Iowa.

"It's a great opportunity to play in such a wonderful stadium and also lets our players know what it feels like because that's where the state playoff championships are played," said University School coach Don Forti. "It's also a motivating thing, like 'Wow, we want to come back here.'"

Dick Rundle, the executive director of the WFCA and the football coach at Monona Grove from 1956-'90, coordinates the event.

Ironically, Rundle spent most of his legendary career as a staunch opponent of expanding the regular season and playoffs.

He won a Class A state title in a game played at Oconomowoc in 1977. The state championship games moved permanently to Camp Randall in 1982, and Monona Grove won its second title as a member of Division 3 in 1984. After experiencing Camp Randall as a state playoff champion, Rundle had a change of heart.

"When I walked off the field, I thought if the playoffs can do so much for a community, a school, and especially the young people, that I was wrong," Rundle said. "If it means this much for teams to get here, what about the teams that never could get here?"

So upon his retirement, Rundle made it his duty to bring the Camp Randall experience to more schools and student-athletes.

Rundle and a committee make plans for the WFCA / Badger Football Classic as soon as the playoff season ends in November.

More than 100 teams apply to participate each year. The number of slots available varies each year, depending on Wisconsin's home schedule. Teams that have never played at Camp Randall are the committee's first choice.

Rundle said UW coach Barry Alvarez has been quite helpful in making the facility available.

The selected teams must meet a quota for ticket sales: 500 for each Division 5 and 6 school, 650 each for Division 3 and 4 and 750 each for Divisions 1 and 2. The tickets cost \$5 and are good for all the games played that day. The schools keep \$1 of every ticket they sell.

Forti acknowledged that getting his school to meet the requirements — and getting proper footwear for the artificial turn a lot of time but was worth every minute.

Rundle said the Camp Randall experience is a thrill not only for the players but for fans, pompom teams, bands and cheerleaders.

"The focus has to be on the football game, but my thought was I wanted it to be an athletic field trip," he said.

Forti said all of University School, from grades 7-12, will load seven buses to Madison for the trip. And every athlete in the football program, including the freshman team, will be in uniform.

"The thought behind it is that the No. 1 school in the state for football, the state's lone Division I football university, is Wisconsin," said Whitefish Bay coach Jim Tietjen. "Any athlete who aspires to play college football probably wants to play for the Badgers, and this is an opportunity for lots of kids to experience the UW field."

So, beginning today, 52 more teams will have that experience, whether they reach the state championship game or not.

"It's so heartwarming to stand with a team at the north end of the stadium and listen to young people talk about what it's like to play on the same field that Ron Dayne played," Rundle said. "Their eyes are as big as saucers."







The short kick led to a 34-yard return for a touchdown by Tyler Nead and an extra point by Danny Mehigan to give Whitefish Bay a 7-6 lead. The Blue Dukes went on to score twice more in the quarter to take a 21-6 first half lead and never looked back.

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Whitefish Bay scored again in the second quarter when Eric Powell dragged a Dominican defender into the end zone for a touchdown from 10 yards out. Mehigan added an extra point for a 14-6 lead.

The Blue Dukes added another touchdown when Nead jumped between two Knight defenders to grab a pass and score a 52-yard touchdown from Mehigan. Another Mehigan kick gave Bay its 21-6 halftime edge.

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The 21-point second quarter was a nice recovery after Whitefish Bay started the game with some non-chalant play. The Blue Dukes collected 10 of their 14 penalties in the first half, most of them coming on what Tietjen called "nonaggressive penalties." Bay finished the game with 110 yards in penalties.

"We weren't really ready to play," Tietjen said. "We had to get into it. We were

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jumping offsides, we had men in motion, we were coming to the line too soon. It was stuff we're better than."

And Dominican didn't play the type of game that might be expected from a squad that finished 0-10 in 2002. The Knights put up 234 yards of total offense on the Blue Dukes, including 234 passing yards by Kwiatkowski.

Tietjen noticed the difference one season has made.

"This is a much improved Dominican team and I told their coach that," he said.

But Whitefish Bay is not finished improving, either. Tietjen said the Blue Dukes' best games are still ahead of them. They will begin showing that improvement Friday when they host Nicolet in the North Shore Conference opener.

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

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lead. Daniels added his first touchdown of the game in the third quarter on a 25yard run before Whitefish Bay could get on the board.

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Delivering an unexpected knockout punch

Mukwonago's 35-point quarter flattens Bay

Mukwonago - Friday was the Hall of Fame Game at Mukwonago High School, as the school inducted 24 former athletes and coaches into its inaugural class.

If the Indians' season opener was an indicator of things to come, Mukwonago's 2003 prep football team might put that many into the Hall itself.

The Indians dominated visiting Whitefish Bay thanks to a commanding effort in the trenches and a monster third quarter. Mukwonago scored 28 points in the first 41/2 minutes of the second half and 35 in all in that period.

The result was a ridiculously easy 56-13 non-conference victory for the Indians. The game marked the first time since Oct. 2, 1998, that Mukwonago had scored at least 50 points in a game.

"I've never lost to anybody this bad," said Blue Dukes coach Jim Tietjen, who was an assistant coach at Mukwonago from 1978-'85. "We wanted to come in and give a good showing. But that didn't happen."

Far from it. Whitefish Bay was within striking distance at halftime, trailing by just 14-7. But that's when the bottom fell out for the Blue Dukes.

After Whitefish Bay went nowhere in its first three plays of the third quarter, Mukwonago's Nicholas Hendriksen returned a punt 46 yards for a score. On the Blue Dukes' next offensive play, quarterback Danny Mehigan tried lofting a screen pass in the flat. Mukwonago linebacker Taner Hasanoglu intercepted and returned it 25 yards for a touchdown.

Three plays later, Mukwonago's Bradley Fehly intercepted a pass from Mehigan and returned it 47 yards to the Blue Dukes' 1. That set up a touchdown run by quarterback Kyle Berger. And just three plays after that, Mehigan lost a fumble, and on the Indians' next play from scrimmage, sophomore tailback Bruce Zalud rumbled 35 yards for a score in his first varsity carry.

In the matter of just 41/2 minutes, a potential nail-biter turned into a full-fledged rout.

"I've been watching this team for many years, and I've never seen anything like that," Hasanoglu said. "One thing we had trouble doing last year was scoring points, but that wasn't a problem tonight."

Very little gave Mukwonago problems on this night. The Indians averaged 7.0 yards per rushing attempt, including a whopping 11.3 yards per crack in the second half.

On the flip side, Mukwonago limited the Blue Dukes to just 1.6 yards per play before Whitefish Bay drove for a meaningless
